## 3 Terminology and guidelines

### 3.1 Definition: Operating requirement

An *operating requirement* is a specified value or range of values for a technical characteristic that you must guarantee during operation to avoid incorrect operation and possibly decreasing the useful life of the chip.

#### 3.1.1 Example

This is an example of an operating requirement:

## 3.2 Definition: Operating behavior

An *operating behavior* is a specified value or range of values for a technical characteristic that are guaranteed during operation if you meet the operating requirements and any other specified conditions.

### 3.2.1 Example

This is an example of an operating behavior:

## 3.3 Definition: Attribute

An *attribute* is a specified value or range of values for a technical characteristic that are guaranteed, regardless of whether you meet the operating requirements.

### 3.3.1 Example

## 3.4 Definition: Rating

A *rating* is a minimum or maximum value of a technical characteristic that, if exceeded, may cause permanent chip failure:


- *Operating ratings* apply during operation of the chip.
- *Handling ratings* apply when the chip is not powered.




## 3.7 Guidelines for ratings and operating requirements

Follow these guidelines for ratings and operating requirements:

- Never exceed any of the chip's ratings.
- During normal operation, don't exceed any of the chip's operating requirements.
- If you must exceed an operating requirement at times other than during normal operation (for example, during power sequencing), limit the duration as much as possible.

## 3.8 Definition: Typical value

A *typical value* is a specified value for a technical characteristic that:

- Lies within the range of values specified by the operating behavior
- Given the typical manufacturing process, is representative of that characteristic during operation when you meet the typical-value conditions or other specified conditions

Typical values are provided as design guidelines and are neither tested nor guaranteed.

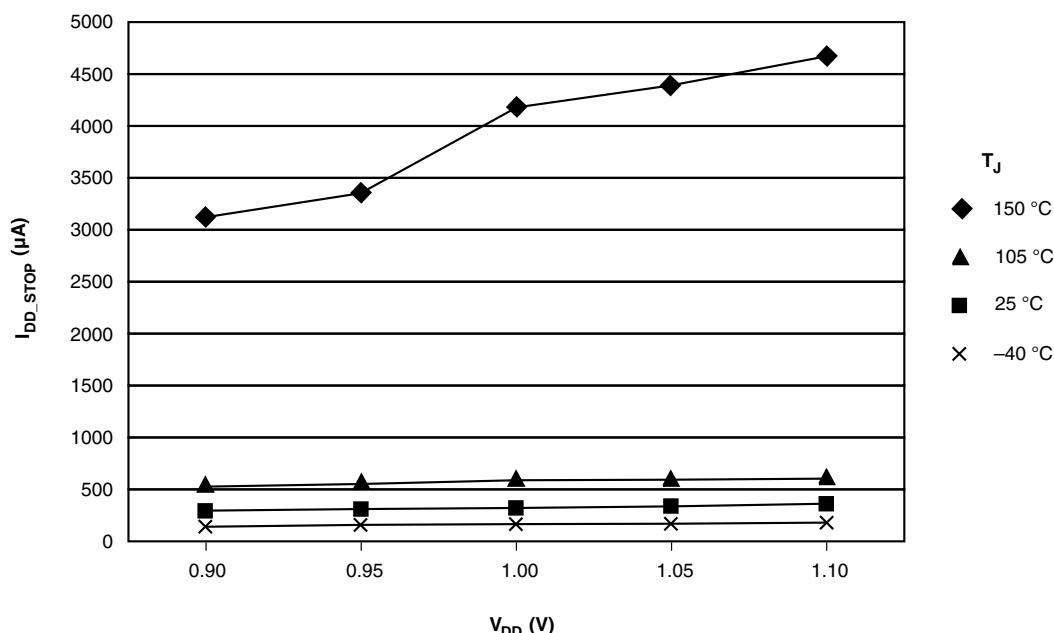



## 5 General

### 5.1 AC electrical characteristics

Unless otherwise specified, propagation delays are measured from the 50% to the 50% point, and rise and fall times are measured at the 20% and 80% points, as shown in the following figure.



The midpoint is  $V_{IL} + (V_{IH} - V_{IL})/2$ .

1. All I/O pins are internally clamped to  $V_{SS}$  through a ESD protection diode. There is no diode connection to  $V_{DD}$ . If  $V_{IN}$  greater than  $V_{IO\_MIN}$  ( $= V_{SS}-0.3 \text{ V}$ ) is observed, then there is no need to provide current limiting resistors at the pads. 








Figure 9. Typical hysteresis vs. Vin level (VDD = 3.3 V, PMODE = 0)




Figure 10. Typical hysteresis vs. Vin level (VDD = 3.3 V, PMODE = 1)










Figure 17. I2S/SAI timing — master modes





Figure 18. I2S/SAI timing — slave modes




Figure 20. I2S/SAI timing — slave modes




Figure 22. KL46 100-pin LQFP pinout diagram




Figure 24. KL46 64-pin LQFP pinout diagram
